

People wearing masks!


Staying home all the time!

See how the spikes on his sides look like a crown?




He is a virus. A virus is a special kind of bug that is teeny-teeny-teeny-teeny-tiny!

He lives with other animals like birds and bats. Bats and birds are very important creatures for the environment.




Usually humans stay away from birds and bats, so they don't meet Mr. Corona too often.

Sometimes, he made them SNEEZE!






Sometimes, he made them COUGH!


Sometimes, he made them have a FEVER!

One day Mr. Corona met another virus. She also had a beautiful crown on her head.






They got married and had little baby viruses. Look at their family portrait!


The Corona family traveled all over the world together, hitching rides

on planes...




On trains...

#### Even on cruise ships!




They continued to make mischief wherever they went.

She smiled at Jasper. "Tibbity tabita took, baroo baroo kuhdoo." (I am only a tiny baby, so I will need your help.)





he washed his hands!




He learned that the Coronas HATED small crowds. They loved it when people gathered together in big groups.

-Cover coughs and sneezes


-Eat food at home

-Keep hands away from your face and your sister's face Slowly, people all around town began listening to Jasper and Tabitha and started playing their own tricks on the naughty Coronas.


Doctors and nurses wore masks to protect themselves and keep from spreading sickness to patients.

Garbage collectors picked up trash full of the pesky Coronas.






Pharmacists made sure that sick people got the pills that they needed.




Scientists tried to find medicine and vaccines to fight the Coronas.

Men and women who delivered the mail brought letters to people to keep them from feeling too lonely.




People who drove trains and buses made sure that everyone stayed far apart. Those Coronas can hop, hop, hop through the air!



Farmers made sure that enough vegetables could be delivered to people's homes.


Gas station workers kept fuel in everyone's cars.





Bank workers made sure there was enough money to buy food.


Childcare workers watched the little children whose mothers and fathers were at work.



People kept watch over the dogs and cats at animal shelters, keeping them warm and safe.




Reporters helped keep everyone informed about the Corona family's naughty antics.
