Samoan Kids in the City: The Impact of Samoan Parenting Practices on Children's Independent Mobility and Physical

A substantial decline in children's activity levels has occurred in NZ, particularly for Pacific children. Independent mobility (outdoor play and travelling to destinations unsupervised - IM), an integral component of physical activity (PA) in childhood, has also declined radically. There is evidence that the family environment and the role of parents as gatekeepers influence children's activity behaviours. The modern reality sees extended families, traditional households and 'way of life' for Pacific people changing. Have safety-conscious parenting practices, cultural traditions and beliefs, westernisation, and urbanisation converged to produce Pacific children living increasingly sedentary lives? This study explores the impact of Samoan parenting practices on children's independent mobility and physical activity.

The Relationship between Lotu and Ako for Pacific University Students in New Zealand

Improving the educational achievement of Pacific peoples is a concern. My study explored the relationship between lotu (spirituality/ faith/ church) and ako (formal education) amongst Pacific university students. Lotu is defined within the context of the Christian tradition. The study objective was to identify the mechanisms by which lotu influences the academic achievement of Pacific university students. A blend of qualitative ethnography and the Talanoa approach provided the conceptual framework. The findings suggest a positive relationship between lotu and educational achievement for these students. In my presentation I will discuss some key findings and implications of this study.
