When people have read the objects of the League and the speech of His Excellency, they are asked to form their own conclusions.

ObJects: The advancement of Samoa and to present to the Administration and the Government of New Zealand from time to time subjects concerning the Government of Western Samoa which may be considered by the members of the League essential for the promotion of the peace, order, good government and the general welfare of the territory.
